Dear Community Members,

Normally I am at Mrs. Nauman's side on Wednesdays for the preparation of any given Sunday bulletin. This time, however, I will almost be touching down in Indianapolis as Mrs. Nauman is finishing up this Sunday's bulletin. Father Orłowski will have the honor of proofreading this edition.

Father took me to the airport at 5:30 this morning (May 18). I'm due to land in Indy about 1:40 PM. My friend and former Pastor, Monsignor Schaedel will pick me up and take me back to his rectory where I'll stay for the duration of my visit.

This is my second time away from you this year. Oh, I was away at Christmas, but I flew out before New Year's Day, so I consider that a "last year's" trip. My first time, if you remember, was the first week of Lent when I went to Chicago to do a recording of the Mozart Requiem. This time, I go to Indianapolis for a wedding and a high school graduation. My next trip will be my vacation in August and then I'll fly home to Philly again come Christmas. Of course, somewhere in this mix I'll also have to make time for my annual retreat as well as the FSSP fall meeting. It's very good that Father Orłowski will be here to cover for me during those times.

Though I don't believe he has many concrete future plans, you remember that he's already had his own trips in this first half of 2016. It's good when there are two priests in an apostolate together. Travel for each is relatively easy and our community saves money since no substitute priests have to be brought in.

We are now in the Octave of Pentecost. Pentecost is such a great feast that it can not be contained in one day. The celebration goes on for eight days and finishes with the Divine Office hour of *None*. The First Vespers that immediately follows is that for Trinity Sunday. Trinity Sunday is the culmination to the miraculous events we witnessed since the beginning of the Liturgical year, way back on the First Sunday of Advent. It is the day when priests and religious, who follow the traditional liturgical calendar, change volumes of the Breviary. For want of a better term, the traditional liturgical calendar now enters a kind of "ordinary time." Those among you with sharp perception and/or good memories may also remember that the Mass propers in the famous "red missalettes" are those of Trinity Sunday.

Very often, those Protestant denominations with liturgical pretensions will refer to the ensuing Sundays as the \_\_\_ Sunday after Trinity. In this country, you'll find this most often in the Episcopal Church (ECUSA, or whatever acronym they're using these days) and the Lutheran Church. Who knows, perhaps the Baptists and Pentecostals have never even heard of Trinity Sunday. Oops! There goes my political incorrectness again, my children and my friends. Father Magiera
