Dear Community Members,

We have now cleared all the major feasts and sacraments of spring and early summer. Along with Fr. Magiera I am thankful for everyone's help and hope you can step back and profit some more from looking at the mystery of Easter and Pentecost and reflecting on the sacraments which you have received and some for the first time this month. Recent events in the church and in the United States should not impede us from profiting by our community life, but should make us determined to profit and profit greatly.

Last week I began a vocation story and I said that I received an important letter from a former roommate who had entered the seminary. He knew I had questions about how I could tell I was being called. He offered a very simply answer writing that a man knows he has a vocation when the bishop puts his hands on the man's head, when he is ordained a deacon! It is the church that discerns that the man has a vocation not the man.

My roommate answered the next obvious question: how do I know the church wants to discern if I have a vocation? The church is looking to ordain men who do not have impediments and have requisite qualities, particularly the exercise of prudence and a willingness to serve. So here was the big point of the letter, the seminary is the place where the church helps men acquire and sees whether they have prudence and at the seminary they come to know whether they are willing to serve. The seminary was the place where a vocation was discerned.

So for me it was whether in an honest estimation of myself I might be able to acquire those qualities. I did not have to be sure that I could make it and I could not be absolutely sure that I would anyways, because it was ultimately the decision of the church to ordain.

I was working at the time and so it was hard to get away and join the seminary. I had to leave my successful career as a computer programmer. I had to make the decision to quit my job even if I might not have a vocation. But the decision was not as big: take some time out from pursuing a career to discern and possibly do great things with God's help.

The mysteries of church in its feasts and sacraments propose that great things can be done with God's help. We almost never are sure that we can do great things the moment we conceive of them. In the face of growing opposition in the world it is ever more important to remind ourselves that our decisions in life can be put this way: we need to make those good decisions which are not that big, but get us closer to possibly gaining everything!
