Dear Community Members,

We are now into the month of October, one of the months dedicated to Our Lady. In fact, this month is usually referred to as the month of the Most Holy Rosary. We celebrated that feast on Wednesday, 7 October.

The Feast of the Most Holy Rosary, in the universal, traditional liturgical calendar is a feast of the second class. There is an exception to this, as you might guess, and this exception is observed in such churches that have as their patron Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary. In such churches, the feast is celebrated as a feast of the first class. As you might guess, this was the case in my former parish in Indianapolis. It is also the case at the FSSP's parish in Vienna, OH, at The Queen of the Most Holy Rosary.

As a feast of the second class, the Divine Office is “bigger” than it is on a feast of the third class, for example, the feast of St. Bridget of Sweden, 8 October, or a “feria” of the fourth class (ordinary calendar day that might or might not have a special saint's commemoration), like Monday, 5 October.

On feasts of the first or second class, in addition to the normal nine psalms in the office of Matins, there are nine readings, instead of the “normal” three.

In the second set of readings for the feast of the Most Holy Rosary, there was a sort of compendium of the three miraculous uses or “interventions” in Church – and world – history, where the Rosary was the “star.” The first was during the time of the Albigensian heresy, an insidious movement that ultimately was conquered through the praying of the Rosary, promoted, by St. Dominic. The second was the magnificent conquering of the Turks at the Battle of Lepanto. The third was the repulsion of the Turks (again, those pesky Turks) in the Austro-Turkish War, 1716 – 1718.

The month of October is also going to be a busy one for us as well. No, we won't have to do any routing of Turkish forces, but today, Sunday, we will have our Second Sunday Pot-Luck (with talent show), executed by our own Mrs. Caleb Elsinger Janie, Mrs. Eric Couron, Laura, and Mrs. Christopher Ryland, Martha (Marti). I thank them very much for stepping up to the plate. I know that they, as “newbies,” along with our dependable “regulars” (y'all know who they are) will serve as examples and an inspiration to get more and more families involved in our community gatherings. These events don't “just happen,” you know. They take commitment and work. Don't forget to gear up for our All Saints Party on Sunday, 1 November.

I end by telling you that I'll also include another letter as an insert in this Sunday's bulletin. I won't include that letter in the bulletin on the website because it concerns only us. I'm happy to say that our website and its bulletins are read by quite a few people “out there” in the ether. But the insert letter doesn't concern them. However, any SJB member can contact me for an electronic copy if you won't be able to get a hard copy of this Sunday's bulletin.

Oh, before I close, I remind you again that it is the months of September and October that the diocese requires “attendance” statistics. It is only to our benefit that every effort be made to attend Mass here during those months. The FSSP also requests these statistics as well. Of course, it goes without saying that you should always come here for Mass. After all, if you're a member here, you should attend Mass here, right?
